UFO SIGHTING, WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUNDS, NEW MEXICO 3 November 1957

RELIABILITY OF SOURCE: Source appeared to be quite ingenuous, naive and impressionable. He was immaculately dressed in his Army uniform and meticulously observed military courtesy. Source appeared to be quite sincere, cooperative, and was eager to describe the sighting. By the time this interviewer was able to talk with Source, he had been interviewed several times by press representatives as well as military personnel, had discussed it with the other patrol, and so gave all answers without hesitation or uncertainty. In the opinion of this interviewer, Source is quite sincere in his belief that he truly saw "something;" however, it is believed that this has been magnified out of all proportion.

SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: At approximately 0230, 3 November 1957. Cpl X together with PFC Y, was on a routine motor patrol of the "up range" area of the White Sands Proving Grounds, when he noticed a "very bright" object high in the sky. This object slowly descended to an altitude estimated to be approximately fifty (50) yards where it remained motionless for about three (3) minutes, then descended to the ground where the light went out. The object was not blurred or fuzzy, emitted no vapor or smoke. The object was in view for about ten (10) minutes, and Source estimated that it was approximately two (2) or three (3) miles away. It was estimated to be between seventy-five (75) and 100 yards in diameter, and shaped like an egg. Source stated that it was as large as a grapefruit held at arms length. The weather was cold, drizzling, and windy, and Source stated no stars were visible. After the light went out, Source and FFC Y continued north to the STALLION SITE CAMP and reported the incident to the Sergeant of the Guard, who returned to the area but failed to find anything. Source's signed and sworn statement to his Commanding Officer is quoted in full:

"AT about 0230-0300 Sunday morning, I, CPL X and PFC Y were on patrol in Range Area when we noticed a very bright object high in the sky. We were proceeding north toward South Gate and object kept coming down toward the ground. Object stopped approximately fifty (50) yards from the ground and went out and nothing could be seen. A few minutes later object became real bright (like the sun) then fell in an angle to the ground and went out. Object was approximately seventy-five (75) to 100 yards in diameter and shaped like an egg. Object larded by the bunker area approximately three (3) miles from us. Object was not seen again./END OF STATEMENT"

PFC Y was not available for interview, since he was on a three (3) day pass; however, his signed and sworn statement to his Commanding Officer is quoted in full:

\*I. FFC Y, saw a fire like object about 0230 the 3 Nov 57 between the bunker area and South Cate, this is about all I remember seeing it was about sixty (60) or eighty (80) feet off the ground and it started down slow then it went out for a while, then I saw it again and it started down in about a forty (40) degree angle. It was about three (3) miles away and was about 120 feet in diameter./ END OF STATEMENT

RELIABILITY OF SCURCES: Both Sources, interviewed by press and military personnel prior to this interviewer's talk with them, gave identical accounts of the sighting. The two (2) Sources were neat and observed military courtesy at all times, but impressed this interviewer as being not at all observant or competent witnesses. The general tenor of their conversation did not indicate keen insight of details, nor did it indicate above average intelligence. In the opinion of this interviewer, Source's account of the sighting has been magnified out of all proportion to its importance, and the attendant publicity has been more sensational than factual.

SOURCES' DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: At approximately 2000, 3 November 1957, the two (2) Sources were on a routine motor patrol near the Trinity site at the White Sands Proving Grounds, New Mexico, driving west in a jeep. The night was fairly bright with some stars visible through scattered clouds. The moon was visible. At the same moment, both Sources became aware of a bright light in the sky, which slowly climbed to approximately forty-five (45) degrees from the horizon. The light appeared to pulsate, and was the color of heated metal; red, then white. At no time did it disappear behind clouds. Sources did not observe any smoke or vapor, nor did they hear any unusual sounds. The object climbed in the sky until it looked like a star and then disappeared. The object did not have a distinct silhouette, but appeared blurred and fuzzy. Sources viewed the object for approximately twenty-five (25) minutes. Signed and sworn statements made to their Commanding Officer are quoted below:

Signed and sworn statement of SP-3 A to his Commanding Officer is quoted in full:

On the four (4) to twelve (12) Patrol. 3rd Nov 57, SP-3 Z and I. SP-3 A, on our check at Trinity Site, at approximately 2000, we looked in the general area of the West Impact area, and seen a bright light leave the ground and proceeding slowly into the air, we watched it for a few minutes and then proceeded to Nip Site, when we reached the Range Rad, the object kept getting brighter, then going dimmer, then out then proceed to get brighter again. On arriving at Mip Site, we set and watched it for a few minutes then it disappeared, we then proceeded to the PMO and notified the SCT of the Guard. On our way to the PMO we seen the object several times and then disappear again./END OF STATEMENTS

Signed and sworn statement of SP-3 Z to his Commanding Officer is quoted in full:

"On or about 2000 hours 3 November 1957 ET-3 A and myself, SP-3 Z, saw a large bright light hanging approximately fifty (50) feet over bunker. It took off at forty-five (45) degree angle and went up into the sky, then it started blinking on and off. Then it disappeared. I would say it was two or three hundred feet long and just about as wide. It was very bright, as the sun. We were approximately four or five miles west of the light./HND OF STATEMENT'S

#### SUPPLIMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE REFORMS:

- 1. A check with Dr. Lincoln LaPaz, Head of the Department of Meteoretics at the University of New Mexico, revealed that no unusual meteorological or astronomical phenomena occurred during this period.
- 2. Weather records reveal that the planet Venus was at first magnitude at 2000 hours MST, and at 15 degrees elevation, with an azimuth of 225 degrees.
- 3. Moonset on 3 November 1957 was at 0229 hours MST at an azimuth of 270 degrees.

#### CONCLUCIONS:

- 1. The conclusion is that the first patrol probably, due to refraction, mistook moonset for an UFO and that the second patrol probably witnessed the planet Venus.
- 2. Both sightings were made by young and impressionable Sources, on duty in lonely and isolated areas.

#### E-M and Non-E-M Saucers

The next UFOs reported in this series belong to the old-fashioned, non-E-M variety. From White Sands Proving Grounds near Alamogordo, New Mexico, came a report that military police, while patrolling the up-range in a jeep about 2:30 Sunday morning (a few hours after the Saucedo incident), had seen a brilliant reddishorange light, shaped like an egg, hovering in the sky. From its apparent distance (two to three miles away) and apparent size (as large as a grapefruit held at arm's length), the men deduced that it was a huge object, 75 to 100 yards in diameter [2]. After remaining motionless for about three minutes, it descended toward the ground and disappeared. (According to some versions, it later rose into the sky and then disappeared.) Members of another jeep patrol soon matched this tale with the report that on Sunday night about eight o'clock they had seen a bright, glowing object hovering in the sky but, instead of landing, it suddenly climbed until it got so far up it looked like a star. Both, jeeps, it should be noted, continued to function normally.

Officials at White Sands soon dampened the excitement. The description of the light that appeared at 2:30 A.M. included certain doubtful factors. The night had been overcast and so dark that the stars were not visible, although the cloud cover was broken at intervals. Since the sighting had not included any object of known distance or known size for comparison, the estimates of the UFO's distance and size were of no value. The light might have been small and close; it might equally well have been huge and far away. Under the circumstances, the most probable explanation was that the men had glimpsed the moon (then roughly half full) through broken clouds, and that the apparent movement was an illusion produced by the moving clouds. The Sunday evening UFO was unquestionably the planet Venus. Then nearly at maximum brilliance, it was a conspicuous object in the western sky after sunset and inspired many saucer reports during this week of anxiety.

The White Sands incidents had reached the papers, however, and contributed to the general hysteria. By Monday afternoon, flying eggs were allegedly stopping automobiles as far north as Canada, but the Southwest continued to hold the center of the UFO stage against all competition.

The weather was cold drizzling, and windy, and SOURCE stated no stars were visible.

As for the White Sands sightings, the AF explanation speaks of "lights seen by planes patrolling the area." This is the first mention anywhere of planes; all the newspaper accounts said lights were seen by two two-man jeep patrols - by one at 3 a.m. and by another at 8 p.m. the same day (Nov. 3). Didn't the AF know about the jeeps? Did it know about them and prefer to ignore them, and why? Or were they merely being careless about their \$10,000 facts? Were the lights also seen by planes? Whatever the reason for this discrepancy, we can test the AF conclusions only against the reports of the jeep observers. Says the AF: "The reports of the plane pilots were apparently explainable by the planet Venus in an unusually favorable position for observation, or by cloud formations around the moon." So far as the jeeps are concerned, the first explanation is all wrong and the second is preposterous. Venus is NEVER visible at all at 3 o'clock in the morning, and on November 3 it had set at 7:30 p.m., half an hour before the second jeep patrol saw anything. As for the alternate explanation suggested, the soldiers' descriptions of what they saw (page 2) indicates that such celestial acrobatics of "cloud formations around the moon" (in New Mexico's notoriously clear skies) were never seen before nor since.

## Motorist Kills Two Policemen

Rockingham, N.C. (UP) — A dark-skinned gunman shot two state highway patrolmen to death in separate incidents 60 miles apart last night and fled before his trail could be picked up.

The shootings which occurred an hour apart touched off a manhunt throughout central North Carolina. Roadblocks were thrown up on all major highways between here and Raleigh 100 miles to the north.

THE VICTIMS were Patrolman Wister Lee Reece, 40 years old, of Ramseur, N.C., shot near Ellerbe, N.C., and Patrolman James Thomas Brown, 33, of High Point, shot on U.S. 1.

A motorist with dark skin and believed to be either a Mexican, Indian or Negro, was believed almost certainly to have killed both patrolmen, authorities said.

Reece was shot at close range 10 miles north of here at about 7 p.m. and died within a few minutes. An hour later Brown radioed he was chasing a speeding car on U.S. 1, where he was shot.

BROWN radioed he had stopped the car seven miles north of Sanford. The patrol

## Senate To Probe Lag In Nation's Missile Program

Washington (AP) — A Senate investigation of the United States satellite and missile program was ordered yesterday as Sputnik II, the Soviet's second satellite, sailed on through space with a furry dog aboard.

Soon afterwards the White House announced that President Eisenhower had altered previous plans and will make a major address to the American people 'tomorrow night. The subject: "Science and Security."

The President had planned to speak on this subject at Oklahoma City Nov. 13. Obviously spurred by the Russian scientific successes, he advanced the address by almost a week and will choose another topic for Oklahoma City. Tomorrow, incidentally, is the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

SENATOR JOHNSON (D.-Tex.) announced that the satellite and missile probe will be launched this month by his preparedness subcommittee, a unit of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Johnson is the Senate's Democratic leader.

He said the Russian achievement in hoisting two satellites into the skies has "handed us both a technological and a propaganda defeat." His subcommittee is not particularly interested in blaming anyone in the



## 'Object' Sighted Often As M.P.s Relate Landing

White Sands Proving Ground headquarters reported

last night three military police who spotted a mysterious object agreed what they saw looked like the landing and takeoff of a space ship.

In an open session with public information officer William Haggard and intelligence officers, the trio pieced together a startling tale of what appeared to be the movements of a "controlled device," as the men called it.

The military policemen were stationed at the northern tip of the 100-mile White Sands Proving range, in an isolated area near Stallion Site, where the first A-bomb blast occurred in 1945.

## Widow Wins \$574,658

London (AF)—A 34-yearold widow arrived in London yesterday to collect 205,235 pounds (\$574,658) for two pennies that she invested in Britain's weekly football pools lottery.

"Thank God," said an almost hysterical Mrs. Nellie McGrail, "I can pay off the mortgage on my house — and also the mortgage on my father's house."

Her win was the biggest jackpot ever chalked up by any winner in the nation's privately operated pools gamble, which are legal here.

The pool operator (Littlewoods) pays the taxes on the winnings.

Mrs. McGrail, who plays the football pools every week as a habit, didn't even bother to check over the results of last Saturday's

THE FIRST she knew of her staggering good luck was shortly after midnight Monday night when a representative of the operators awakened her at her home in Reddish, in the north of England.

"Mrs. McGrail," said the man, standing outside in the rain. "I have the pleasure of telling you that you have won a considerable amount of money on the football pools."

"It's a considerable sum, and, by the way, may I come in out of the rain?"

Mrs. McGrail's husband, a truck driver, was killed in an accident last April.

Early yesterday morning, Mrs. McGrail and her two daughters, Irene, 17, and Barbara, 11, left for London.

She was handed her tremendous winnings at a ceremony at one of London's biggest hotels (Grosvenor House) last night.

THE OPERATORS of the pools said it was possible the widow also would collect a second prize and share in a third prize.

The operators of Britain's football pools lotteries pay off on the total number

of points scored by a forecaster of results—not by scores.

They award three points for predicting a tie, two points for correctly picking a team to win away from home, and one point for correctly guessing that a team will win at home.

The perfect score is 24 points—three points each for correctly predicting eight tie games.

Mrs. McGrail forecast seven ties for 21 points and picked up two more for being right about an awayfrom-home win.

The picks are made on games in all of the British Football (Soccer) Leagues.

Picking the winners is a national pastime. The operators collect all of the money and then take out all of their expenses plus a small percentage. The remaining money is paid in prizes with 55 per cent going to the winner, 20 per cent to second, 15 per cent third and 10 per cent to fourth.

## Democrats Win Eastern Voting

Democrats continued their winning ways in off-year elections yesterday as Democratic Governor Robert B. Meyner of New Jersey won re-election against his Eisenhower - supported challenger, Malcolm S. Forbes.

Meyner, who thus boosted his chances for consideration for a place on his party's 1960 presidential ticket, swept to victory with the help of some Republican and independent votes.

FORBES, a 38-year-old state senator and wealthy magazine publisher who ran as an Eisenhower Republican, conceded defeat at 10:12 p.m. At the time, Meyner had a lead of 167,000 votes with a bit more than half the votes tabulated.

Two hours earlier, the Democrats had made a clean sweep of the more important posts at stake in yesterday's state and local elections by electing a governor in Virginia and re-electing a mayor of New York City.

Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler issued a statement shortly after 10 p.m. saying the returns from the three top contests show that the American people are "turning to the Democratic

party for leadership in a time of crisis."

MEYNER also appeared to have carried a Democratic State Assembly with him.

Democrat J. Lindsay Almond Jr. won the Virginia governorship handily over Republican Ted Dalton after a hot campaign over how to preserve the state's racially segregated schools.

Almond ran under the banner of the Byrd Democratic organization and its program of "massive resistance" to school integration.

## Sky 'Object' Spotted at A-Bomb Site

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUND, N. M., Nov. 4 (R),-The Army today reported that a huge oval object "nearly as bright as the sun" was spotted Sunday hovering near bunkers used in the first atomic bomb explosion.

The sightings were made seventeen hours apart by two different military police patrols on this southern New Mexico missile testing range. The first atomic bomb was touched off on the northern edge of the

area July 16, 1945. First Lt. Miles F. Penney, commanding officer of the M. P.'s, said none of the men had heard radio reports or seen newspaper accounts of similar sightings in Texas yesterday.

Both sighting were in the area of abandoned bunkers used by technicians who observed the world's first atomic explosion.

Lt. Penney said one sighting was made by a two-man patrol

at around 8 p. m. Sunday. Sp. 3/c Forest R. Oakes and Sp. 3/c Barlow reported that time their patrol saw a bright light, Specialist Oakes thought hanging about fifty feet above the old atom bunker. He said the "large bright light took off at a 45 degree angle into the sky and started blinking. Then it disappeared.

This patrol estimated the object's size as "200 or 300 feet long." "It was very bright," Specialist Oakes said. He said his patrol was two or three miles west of the light.


